WASHINGTON 2006: World Philatelic Exposition, May 27 - June 3

look at the Show's website tells you that the Show was "A Success by All Standards." Self-congratulatory, to be sure, but warranted.

Here are some numbers:

- Total attendance for the eight days: 226,187
- 3,823 competitive frames representing 61,168 album pages
- 640 philatelic exhibits and 233 literature exhibits
- 178 frames in the Court of Honor and Invited Exhibits
- 15 additional non-competitive exhibits, including 52 frames of first day covers
- 863 medals were presented to philatelic and literature entries, including 14 d'Honneur, 74 Large Gold, 97 Gold, 178 Large Vermeil, 162 Vermeil, 56 Large Silver, 104 Silver, 59 Silver Bronze, 19 Bronze.
- 43 jurors, 6 apprentice jurors, an expert committee of 2 and a senior consultant
- 88 frames allotted to Societies to publicize their fields of interest
- Sixty-two booths for societies
- 223 dealer and postal administration stands
- 136 postal administrations with their own staffs or represented by agents
- The U.S. Postal Service reported that its revenues exceeded one million dollars
- Auctions with a total realization, including buyer's commissions, exceeding \$10 million dollars

The Court of Honour:

- The Royal Philatelic Collection of Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II
- Great Britain: The 6 May 1840 cover with 10 Penny Blacks
- Barbados: original artwork and proofs of the Britannia design prepared in 1848 for Mauritius (but not used there until 1858), used instead for the Barbados 1852 and later issues, including bisects on cover; artwork, proofs, etc. for the 1873 5/- issue; plus 1878 overprints Bermuda: 1 page of Perot provisionals, plus 1874 and 1875 overprints
- British Guiana: 8 pages with Cotton Reel issues followed by the 1852 lithographed issue
- Jamaica: proofs of the 1919-21 issue, plus blocks of the unissued 6d value together with the temporary substitute and revised design
- Cayman Islands: 7 pages dealing with the 1938 dolphin fish mistake
- Falkland Islands: 8 pages treating the 1964 ship error



- The Collection of His Serene Highness The Prince of Monaco, Albert II
- Early Monaco postal history covering early markings, the 1885 first issues of the Principality, and the Sardinian and French periods
- New York International exhibition issue of 1956
- The 1956 Royal Marriage of Prince Rainier III and Princess Grace issue
- The 1956 and 1966 Royal Couples issues
- The 1993 joint US/Monaco issue commemorating Grace Kelly
- The 1966 and 2004 issues on Princess Grace and her children.

And some special exhibits:

- John Lennon's childhood stamp collection. The hard covered British 'Mercury Stamp Album' dating from around 1950 contains 565 stamps from various countries, and originally belonged to Lennon's stamp collecting older cousin, Stanley Parkes, who introduced him to the hobby. Ten year old John scratched off his cousin's name and address on the album's flyleaf and wrote his own name and address in blue ballpoint pen. His name is found in several places on the page. A number of other doodles appear on the album's title page, where he drew moustaches and beards on the images of Queen Victoria and King George VI.
- The "Inverted Jenny" Plate Block
- The Pony Express. A comprehensive collection of the 1869-61 Pony Express and the 1862-65 Virginia City Express, including an April 3, 1860 eastbound First Day Cover, the \$4 Black Pony on cover, and the \$1 Red Pony on cover to Switzerland.
- The Devil's Mail This exhibit is all about man's inhumanity to man, as depicted by examples of mail. It features a Unibomber cover, hijacking of airlines by terrorists, bomb mail recovered from exploded airliners, train hijacking, covers e-rayed for explosives and irradiated mail due to anthrax. It also shows a cover from an explosion caused by a son blowing up an airplane to kill his mother.

An exhibition such as this one is held every ten years in the USA. And, of course, there are similar large exhibitions in other






MICHEL CATALOGUE REVIEWS: EUROPE

All the stamps of Europe in seven volumes (organized according to practical geographical units) is what MICHEL is doing for 2006, a restructuring from their previous four volumes. Four installments have been released, with three more coming in September.

MICHEL Europe Catalogue 2006, Vol. 1: Central Europe. 1152 pages, over 13 000 colour illustrations, more than 61 000 price quotations. €44.00

Prices for this area are generally stable, although significant price increases have occurred for Austria, Liechtenstein, Switzerland and Slovakia. This volume now lists two types of cancellations for stamps of Austria: legitimate cancels applied during postal transmission, and others whose cancels are not easily determined to be legitimate.

MICHEL Europe Catalogue 2006, Vol. 2: South-West Europe. 1184 pages, over 12 000 colour illustrations, over 60 000 price quotations. €44.00

This area exhibits generally stable prices, although the demand for joint issues results in significant price increases for these issues. French Andorra, France, Portugal Azores and Madeira show significant price increases in some areas.

MICHEL Europe Catalogue 2006/2007, Vol. 3: Southern Europe. 1184 pages, 13 000 colour illustrations, over 62 000 price quotations.

The demand for joint issues results in significant price increases for these issues, with most other prices generally stable. Some stamps of Macedonia, Malta and the Vatican have seen good price increases.

The editors caution that the present market situation might be prone to speculation.

MICHEL Europe Catalogue 2006/2007, Vol. 4: South-East Europe. 1120 pages, 14 000 colour illustrations, over 60 000 price quotations. €44.00


Again there is demand for joint issues of this area. Turkish Cyprus and Greece after 1945 have experienced higher than average price increases.



WHAT WOULD YOU DO? SILLY QUESTION!

Describing them as "...a fresh and contemporary

interpretation of kapa haka,...Maori performing arts stamps [that] offered 'a wonderful opportunity' to celebrate an art form that was 'totally unique' and of great cultural significance to New Zealanders," New Zealand Post planned to release six stamps on June 7 depicting Maori in a range of kapa haka stances. However, before the release date massive negative reaction led to cancellation of the issue:

- "ugly" postage stamps depicting cartoon kapa haka performers"
- "new Maori performing arts stamps depict Maori in a negative light."
- "the 'disgusting' stamps made New Zealand the laughing stock of the world."
- "the series was in bad taste."
- "The cartoon-type characters depicted are culturally insensitive."
- "The details are inaccurate. The designs are ridiculous and out of proportion with bulging muscles."
- "'jam labels' which will make us the laughing stock of the world."
- "stupid and insensitive."
- "They are modern hand-drawn and not symbolic of Maori. They look cheap and ugly."
- "Even the colours are all wrong."

You get the idea. And New Zealand Post did not issue the stamps. It was first reported, however, that employees of New Zealand Post did release about 500 sets to regular customers. Ivor Masters, New Zealand Post stamps and

collectibles general manager, said eight customers had received the stamps before the issue date. (Gibbons Stamp Monthly for September reports that the following items were released: four \$2 singles; nine FDCs, six sets plate imprint blocks; three complete mint sets; one gummed cancelled set; one 45¢ self-adhesive dispenser box; two 45¢ self-adhesive mint stamps; one 45¢ self-adhesive cancelled stamp; eleven selfadhesive stamp booklets; three mint presentation packs; 48 blank FDCs). Mr Masters urged those who ordered the stamps and received them through "human error" to return them to New Zealand Post. Any Bets?

The United States Postal Service issued four se-tenant 39¢ American Motorcycle stamps August. 7 in Sturgis, S.D. The stamps show an Indian 1940, a Cleveland 1918, a chopper circa 1970 and a Harley-Davidson 1965.

All the designs, except the chopper, are based on actual motorcycles.

Two years ago South Korea produced a set of stamps featuring Takeshima, one of the two islets which have historically been claimed by both South Korea and Japan; the issue produced furious reaction in Japan. Now North Korea has issued stamps picturing the disputed islands, and South Korea has agreed to sell them.

FIAF has distributed them to federations in this hemisphere. Several of these federations had no frames and as a result had never held a national exhibition. Others had frames so old that they were nearly unusable.
